Flip-flops, bears and Bach:

Lessons learned by a hike leader

Get Outdoors Poconos hikers have covered a lot of ground since July 2015.

We've stood a thousand feet above the Delaware River at Stairway Lake near Milford. We've been eye-level with the confluence of the Brodhead and the Delaware at Smithfield's Minisink Park. Hikers have looked down on the backs of turkey vultures flying past Mount Wismer in Barrett Township, and gotten down on their bellies to peer into pitcher plants at Long Swamp in Dingmans Ferry.

574 hikers have signed up for the 20 hikes offered so far. Together, we've walked

miles of trails, talked about birds' nests and boulders, wetlands and waterways — and shared our deep gratitude for the vision and work it takes to protect this priceless resource of public land.

Some of the many things I've learned along the way:

I've learned that hikers come in every conceivable kind of package. The youngest hiker is not quite 2. The oldest is 85. Some folks are happy to take their time, sniff a whiff of wintergreen, squeeze a mass of sphagnum moss, listen for a while to the bubbling water or a warbler. Others can't wait to get there —

wherever “there” is — the view, the bog, the overlook, the huge boulder. Or even just back to the trailhead.

I’ve noticed that hiking gear is as varied as the hikers themselves. An eighth-grader showed up at the first hike, at Barrett’s Pasold Farm, in cutoffs and flip-flops. At the other end of the gear rainbow was a fella I ran into at Promised Land State Park. He was strung with “performance” gadgets, including a wireless speaker in his backpack, blasting Bach. He said it scares the bears, because “bears don’t like Bach.” Hard to believe.

A walk in the woods doesn’t take special gear, of course. Sturdy boots or shoes, a walking stick if you like, water and a map are all you really need. Skip the flip-flops, though.

I’ve confirmed for myself what the doctors and scientists say: walking in nature is good for you. People need to connect with nature in some way, any way at all — making that connection feeds the spirit. Every hike, whether an easy stroll or a gasping climb, starts at the trailhead with a babble of questions, jokes, exclamations, a general ruckus. Ninety minutes later, as we come out of the woods, faces look relaxed. Voices are low. Quiet smiles and bright eyes tell me it’s been a really beautiful day.

Hope to see you on the trail.

Almost every gardener in the Poconos seeks out deer-resistant plants, and the BWA won’t disappoint them. There will be 40 varieties from which to choose.

“A large majority of the plants are deer resistant and will be labeled as such,” Mattie said. “Also, plants for pollinators and butterflies will be labeled.”

Also new this year: bigger pot sizes. “So think bigger and better,” said Mattie. “There will be something for everyone regardless of what kind of garden you have – full sun, part shade, shade, dry or wet.”
