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## Monroe County 2006 Water Quality Study: Some Streams Are Being Degraded

The County's 2006 Annual Water Quality Report was recently released, and it tells us that six streams in the watershed show declining water quality.

The mouth of the Brodhead, where it meets the Delaware, is the worst – and has been showing a downward trend since 2001. Water quality is also declining on Forest Hills Run downstream of Carlton Road, Marshals Creek upstream of Route209 near Jay Park Plaza, Paradise Creek upstream of Lower Swiftwater Road and upstream of the Route 191 tunnel, Sambo Creek upstream of its mouth near E. Stroudsburg High School, Pocono Creek below Sullivan Trail, and Scot Run above the Crossings.

(Details of the biological scores are in the table below.)

Most headwater streams, however, are still in good shape. Brodhead Creek below Canadensis and below Rt 191, Devils Hole Creek, Paradise Creek below Tank and Yankee creeks confluence. Swiftwater Creek above Rt 611, Indian Run above Fairview Ave and Pocono Creek at Rimrock Road all showed healthy macroinvertebrate populations. The exception is Forest Hills Run, which still suffers from an overload of treated wastewater from the Mt. Pocono sewage treatment plant (STP), complicated by run-off from Rt 611. Mt. Pocono's STP is meeting its permit limits (except for temperature). This has led DEP to question whether their "model" for setting limits is protective enough... a scary thought as we look at possible new large discharges coming on-line.

The study, conducted by the Monroe County Planning Commission and the Conservation District, includes water chemistry, habitat evaluation and analysis of macroinvertebrates – the stream "bugs" that tell the true tale of what's been happening to the health of a stream.

The 2007 study will take place in the first 2 weeks of August. Results will be available early next Spring.

WaterWaze provided students with knowledge of watersheds and wetlands through activities which would be difficult to perform in the classroom. # Continuing Saga of the Invasive Plants IN YOUR NEIGHBORHOOD?

"The lower Pocono Creek is in trouble" reports Dr. Jeri Jewett-Smith and her team of interns who are mapping invasive plants along the stream. Jeri tells us that invasives blanket both banks of the stream, and silt fills the crevices between rocks on the bottom. Take heart, however, some sections, even downstream of the truck stop, and the Rt 611 sprawl, are still in pretty good shape. "There was even one stretch where we got no hits (no invasive plants) at all," Jen

Reader, lead intern tells us.

The Team has walked the complete mainstem of the Pocono (except for those few properties where the landowner would not grant access) and most of the McMichael, with the help of Jim Hartzler, BWA member and manager for Pohoqualine Fish Club. Meanwhile, Dr. Shiziong Hu and his interns, are working in the upper Brodhead watershed. Dr. Hu's project focuses on stream bank erosion hotspots, and is mapping invasive plant locations as well to see if there's a connection.

Most landowners contacted to get access to the stream banks have been supportive and interested, and many have asked the Team members to come back and tell them more about what invasive plants they found, and what can be done to control them. We'll be posting maps of the areas surveyed and what's been found when the study is complete, sometime in the fall.

## BWA Petitions PA DEP to Redesignate the Swiftwater Creek Watershed to Exceptional Value

On June 30, 2007, the BWA filed a petition with the Environmental Quality Board, to redesignate the Upper Swiftwater Creek ( above Rt#611) and Indian Run from High Quality Coldwater Fishery (HQ—CWF) to Exceptional Value (EV).

The BWA was joined in its petition by the Tobyhanna Creek Tunkhannock Creek Watershed Association, the Buck Hill Conservation Foundation The Swiftwater Preserve fishing club, and the Brodhead Chapter of Trout Unlimited.

All streams in Pennsylvania have a legal designation which dictates how the streams can be used. The water quality in a high quality stream can be degraded if a social or economic justification can be demonstrated. It is not permissible to degrade the water quality of a stream with a designation of EV. These regulations apply to both wastewater and stormwater discharges. EV status does not stop development. It forces the developer to maintain the existing quality of a stream.

A decision by the Environmental Quality Board to redesignate the streams will provide greater protection to the water quality of this watershed.

Substantial data and many studies prove that the upper Swiftwater and the Indian Run qualify for EV status, which will be determined by the science

# GOOD NEWS for the Brodhead Creek

The Brodhead Creek from below Stokes Avenue bridge to its mouth at the Delaware it will now be protected as a "cold water fishery." The reclassification is based on data from the PA Fish & Boat Commission and recognizes what everyone who fishes the lower Brodhead knows: the Creek supports reproducing trout.

Protecting the stream for trout of all ages, not just for the trout stocked each year by the Fish Commission, means any discharges to the stream will have to take into account impacts on trout, including temperature impacts. Trout cannot survive at high temperatures. Macroinvertebrates, the favorite food of trout, are also extremely sensitive to temperature.

## <u>Can the Poconos Develop and Still Have</u> <u>Healthy Streams?</u>

To get the answer, the Pocono Creek watershed, the area of land that collects and drains all of the rain or snow melt into the Pocono Creek, was chosen the testing ground for a study led by US EPA and the Delaware River Basin Commission.

Tax dollars are being put to work in order to help local residents make good decisions about how to grow sustainably, protecting both the environment and the economy which depends on the quality of the regional environment.

The study is measuring stream flows, testing groundwater levels and examining the effect of land uses on water resources. trying to learn how much we can take out of the ground, or the streams, and still have enough water left to support stream life You'll be hearing more about what the science tells us soon; and we'll be asking you what you think is important about the Poconos in general, and the Pocono Creek watershed in particular in the Spring of 2008.
