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Pocono Township's projected sewer rates highest in Monroe

Rates expected to be county's highest by 75%

Pocono Township's projected sewer rates already were going to be the highest municipal rates in Monroe County, but now that gap appears to be widening.

At about \$1,400 per equivalent dwelling unit, the township's projected sewer rates are 75 percent higher than the next-most-expensive municipality's residential sewer expense.

Tobyhanna Township charges \$800 a year per unit. The Mount Pocono Municipal Authority charges \$952 per unit for commercial properties — currently the highest commercial rate in the county, but 47 percent lower than Pocono Township's projected rates.

The average residential cost per unit in Monroe County municipalities is about \$550.

Pocono Township will hold a sewer meeting at 6 tonight at the municipal building on Route 611 in Tannersville to discuss the project.

"The only way we can get the rates down is to grow business," Pocono Township Supervisor Frank Hess said. "We're at 570,000 gallons (per day of projected daily usage) and we have 2 million (gallons available). The closer we get to that 2 million, the lower the rates will be, so that's what we have to work on."

Stroudsburg currently has the lowest sewer rates in the county at \$220 per year, per unit.

Borough Manager Barbara Quarantello said the borough expects "small increases" in the rate over the next few years to meet obligations when its plant expansion is completed.

Stroudsburg and Stroud and Pocono townships are teaming to share the cost of the Stroudsburg sewer plant expansion. The Pocono Township system, which is scheduled to open partially in the fall, will empty into Stroudsburg's sewage plant.

Pocono Township's rates had been between \$1,100 and \$1,200 earlier this year, based on usage projections for when the system opens next spring. But those projections were measured five years ago.

When the township reassessed how much usage there would be,

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more than one-third of the projected usage had been lost, causing rate projections to rise.

The current projections for central sewer rates in Pocono Township are subject to change. Adjustments could come with more or less usage by the time it fully opens next spring. The township has not yet set the rates.

Municipal rates are only for government-run sewage collection and treatment systems and do not include rates at private developments.

Pocono Township's rates also will be identical for the small piece of Hamilton Township included in the project.
